%95	8	The speaker is making a logical conclusion.
Less than %50	She <i>may have</i> been ill. She <i>might have</i> been ill. She <i>could have</i> been ill.	8

## Question: Why didn't Jom eat his hamburger?

Degree	Example sentence	Comment
%100	8	The speaker is sure.
%99	8	The speaker believes that it is impossible for Tom to have been hungry.
%95	He must not have been hungry.	?
?	8	The speaker is mentioning one possibility.

Not True:+ V3	Not True:+ V3

## Question: Why wasn't Kate in class?

Degree	Example sentence	Comment
%100	She was ill.	The speaker is sure.
%95	She <i>must have</i> been ill.	The speaker is making a logical conclusion. <b>Extra explanation</b> : "I saw Kate yesterday and found out that she was ill. She was absent today. She is probably ill now. I can't think of any other good reason.
Less than %50	She <i>may have</i> been ill. She <i>might have</i> been ill. She <i>could have</i> been ill.	The speaker is mentioning one possibility.  Extra Explanation: You can express less or more certainty by changing the stress on may, might and could

True: must have + V3	True: might/may/could have + V3
Not True: can't have/couldn't have + V3	Not True: might not / may not have + V3

George must have arrived in San Francisco by now.	I am certain he has arrived in the USA.
He can't /couldn't have got there yet because it will take at least two weeks.	I am certain he hasn't got there.
He might / may / could have stopped for a few days on the way.	It is possible to stop.
He might / may not have had time to do everything he wanted.	It is possible he didn't.
